

After 36 years, in 1952, the school was built on Burroughs and 41st Streets and renamed Ramah SDA Jr. Academy. The school size grew from one-room to four rooms and an auditorium, with an increased enrollment as well. Both school buildings served students in grades one through eight. A short time later, RJA was extended to grade ten, and kindergarten was added.

In 1978, tragedy struck. The school on Burroughs was destroyed by fire. With strong determination and diligence, Ramah constituents repeat the school. In April 1980, the newly constructed building was opened and dedicated. In addition to ten classrooms, the new facility included a science lab, music room, home economics classrooms and a library.

Over the years, Ramah has attracted students from all areas of Savannah, its suburbs and the Low Country. Its facilities have become an asset to the city of Savannah as hundreds of people can attribute their early learning to the teachers of Ramah SDA Junior Academy.

Our parents represent a large number of professionals and paraprofessionals that only want the best for their children. Ramah is widely known throughout the south and in Georgia. RJA is touted for its sound curriculum and the successes of its students. The moral standards are high at Ramah. Our students do not contend with or are exposed to smoking, drugs, pornography, class cutting or fighting. Disrespect of staff is not tolerated.

Our school has proud graduates who continue to contribute to Ramah in-kind and tangibly long after their departure. The Alumni Association is active and viable, sponsoring scholarships for current students and an annual reunion which occurs the second weekend after Easter.
